## MBAE grows business affiliate network

Acting on their members' concerns about education and the workforce, 29 chambers of commerce and industry associations collectively representing more than 26,000 employers across the Commonwealth have joined the fast-growing **MBAE Affiliate Network** since it launched.

## A big win on expanding access to computer science

In June, the Massachusetts Board of Elementary and Secondary Education **acted on MBAE's recommendation** of several years voting to let school districts count computer science courses for graduation. Importantly, the courses must include rigorous mathematical or scientific concepts in order to be substituted for a math or science course required in high school.

This major change signals to districts that computer science is a foundational course of study that they should ensure students have opportunities to pursue and we are confident these actions will lead to increased access for students at schools not even offering this course as an elective.

MBAE Affiliates helped us achieve this victory by joining us in urging the Board to take this action. It is an important achievement, but there is still more work to do to ensure equitable access to computer science education. MBAE is turning its focus to raising awareness about the gross inequities that currently exist and generating solutions to ensure that every student, especially underserved populations, acquire basic knowledge and have opportunities to pursue advanced study in computer science.

## Laying important groundwork on school funding

In the final weeks of the legislative session, MBAE was deeply involved in negotiations on a school funding bill that would have helped cover the costs of health insurance, special education, English Language Learners and low income students.

Although lawmakers were unable to reach agreement on a bill, effectively postponing action until the 2019–2020 session, MBAE was encouraged by the role we played and the foundation we set for further discussion.

We expect school funding will be a major area of focus in the year ahead. This issue will remain a top legislative priority for MBAE. We will continue to advocate for provisions that we were successful in getting added to the House bill **to ensure that state funds allocated for needier students are actually spent on those students; require evaluation of where funds are being used effectively and where they are not; and, require transparent reporting to the public about school spending.** 

Increased K-12 education funding **must be coupled with reforms** that address the many acknowledged shortcomings of the current funding system and reverse our failure to close racial and socio-economic achievement gaps and a widening college and workforce readiness gap.

## Matching grant challenge a success

MBAE was thrilled to meet a matching grant challenge from the **Walton Family Foundation** in February **turning a \$150,000 grant from Walton into \$300,000 in new funding**. This infusion allows us to ratchet up our work advocating for policies that ensure all students, regardless of their zip code, receive a high quality education that prepares them for success.

## An increased focus on preparing students for careers

In response to employers' concerns about students' readiness for the workforce, MBAE has increased its focus on initiatives that prepare students for success in careers.

#### CREDENTIALS FOR SUCCESS

With the help of our **Future Ready Advisory Council**, made up of senior

human resource executives, MBAE is leading a campaign to expand opportunities for high school students to earn industryrecognized credentials. Over the past year, we looked at successful models in other states and crafted a proposal for Massachusetts that dovetails with current state initiatives. MBAE will formally launch the *Credentials for Success* initiative in the coming year calling for legislation that incentivizes schools to offer students opportunities to earn high-value, in-demand credentials.

### CLOSING THE DIGITAL EQUITY GAP

We will continue our focus on ensuring **ALL** students have access to computer science education and digital learning, an increasingly essential area of study in the 21st century. MBAE's **Emerging Leaders Advisory Council** collected data that show gross inequities in access to computer science coursework for students of color, students in urban school systems, and from low-income communities. With guidance from our **Digital Equity Advisory Council**, we are planning a series of Digital Equity Walks—highly interactive and visual presentations of data which highlight where access to computer science coursework is inequitable, demographic disparities exist, and how Massachusetts prepares students for opportunities in our technology centric, knowledge-based economy. The goal is to build awareness about lack of access, develop solutions, and create demand for action.

### **MBAE NEWS BRIEFS**

Executive Director Linda Noonan had the honor of serving on the screening committee for a new DESE Commissioner to replace the late Mitchell Chester. One of only ten people invited to participate, Linda was the only representative of a business advocacy group on the committee.

Jackney Prioly Joseph, MBAE's Director of Career Readiness Initiatives, is serving on the New England **Board of Higher Education** Advisory Committee for their New England High Value Credentials Project; is a member of the Massachusetts ECEP Alliance (Expanding Computing Education Pathways); and, represents MBAE as a member of the Career Advising Steering **Committee** established to build capacity for implementing Six-Year Career Plans (ILPs) for students in grades 6-12 across the Commonwealth.

MBAE's Director of Affiliate Growth and Strategy, Ryan Flynn, served as a **reviewer for the 2018 Massachusetts STEM Summit**. He reviewed proposals for sessions showcasing innovative STEM programs involving collaboration between businesses, schools and colleges. Last year's summit was attended by over 1,400 educators, policymakers and business representatives.

## Success protecting key education reforms

With the help of a united business voice from our growing Affiliate Network, **MBAE defeated bills and budget amendments** successfully thwarting a wellorganized effort to gut the

state's accountability system, place a moratorium on MCAS testing, and roll back teacher evaluation requirements that lead to meaningful and actionable improvements in instruction.

New regulations for the accountability system were approved by the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education (BESE), however, in response to pressure from districts and education groups. Fortunately, the Board acted on several



concerns MBAE and ten of our Affiliates expressed in public comments adding clarity about which measures would be reported annually and more details about the levels used to classify schools and districts. In addition, rather than giving the Department of Elementary and Secondary Education broad power to change the rules in the future, revisions to the accountability regulations will continue to require public input and a BESE vote.

**MBAE was one of only three organizations that weighed in on this important issue.** The others were the two teachers' unions. The state's accountability system is a critical tool to inform action to improve schools and ensure equity in educational opportunities. MBAE will continue to monitor and weigh in when necessary.
